YOUR IMPACT IN NEPAL



MY BUSINESS-MY FREEDOM MICROFINANCE PROGRAM
PARTNER: 3 ANGELS NEPAL

More women building businesses, and graduating into independence.

The My Business - My Freedom (MBMF) Microfinance Program continued helping Nepali women build a way forward through small business ownership. Throughout the year, 680 women were supported—strengthening household stability and creating safer futures for their families.

For many, 2025 marked a first step. 98 women received their first microloan this year, joining the program with a goal of starting small and growing steadily. At the same time, 42 women graduated from MBMF, reaching a point where they can run their businesses independently. This is one of the clearest signs of long-term progress.

Each participant begins with entrepreneurship training, followed by ongoing mentorship in budgeting and money management. Women also join a peer group that provides encouragement and accountability as they build. With their first loan, they start modestly; as they repay, they can qualify for larger loans to expand.

By the end of the year, 638 women had active microloans, continuing to grow their businesses with support from the program.

WOMEN'S SAFE HAVEN AND VOCATIONAL CENTER
PARTNER: 3 ANGELS NEPAL

Safety, healing, and a path back to independence.

In 2025, 87 women and girls found safety at the Women's Safe Haven (WSH), a long-time project of our local partner 3 Angels Nepal. Here, survivors receive counseling and medical care, alongside skills training such as tailoring, beauty, hospitality, and computer literacy. By year-end, 66 women had been reintegrated—returning to their communities, reuniting with family, and beginning again with stronger support behind them.

One of the most meaningful moments this year was "Maiti Bhetghat," a reunion gathering for women and girls who once stayed at WSH and are now back with their families. The goal was simple: provide a safe space to reconnect, share their journeys, and celebrate how far they've come. The event brought together 67 individuals, including women rescued 15–20 years ago.

Many shared how they are now earning independently, through tailoring, beauty work, vegetable farming, or livestock. Again and again, women said gatherings like this remind them they are not alone—and many asked that Maiti Bhetghat continue in the years ahead.



CAPTIVATING EMERGENCY RELIEF
PARTNER: CAPTIVATING NEPAL

87 households received essential food and household items—including rice, lentils, cooking oil, salt, and mosquito nets—helping them get through the immediate crisis with dignity and stability. This short-term support also created space for families to breathe while we prepare longer-term program activities that address the deeper challenges in the community.

Following landslides, 25 families received CGI sheets, provided in coordination with the Ward Chairperson and based on what families needed most for temporary shelter and recovery.

We also responded to urgent needs for 8 children during the winter season, who were attending classes without proper warm clothing or slippers, helping them stay healthy and continue going to school.

ANTI-HUMAN TRAFFICKING MONITORING STATIONS
PARTNER: 3 ANGELS NEPAL

Interception, rescue, and stronger protection at the border.

Human trafficking patterns shift constantly, so border work has to stay both alert and responsive—combining prevention, interception, and rescue in real time.

In 2025, 4,073 people were stopped at the border due to signs of trafficking risk. Each person was interviewed and counseled, informed of their rights and options, and then either safely returned home or reunited with family.

When interviews confirmed exploitation, the response moved from prevention to rescue. 154 women were rescued at the border after trafficking was verified. In coordination with police and partner groups, 60 more women were rescued from hotels and brothels. These efforts also led to the arrest of one trafficker in 2025.

Alongside direct interception and rescue, the program strengthened access to protection services. 800 women received free legal support, including advice and assistance for survivors of abuse. During the year, 81 domestic violence cases were reported and supported, and 39 missing persons were found.

Prevention remained a steady focus. Through the Hamro Abhiyan Anti-Human Trafficking Awareness Program, 3,015 students from 38 schools learned about trafficking risks, safe migration, and prevention strategies. The program also reached 624 police and community members, and 3,072 people through community awareness sessions tailored to local needs.



YOUR IMPACT IN NEPAL



CAPTIVATING VILLAGE PROGRAM
LOCATION: RAPTI MUNICIPALITY AND MANAHARI RURAL MUNICIPALITY
PARTNER: 3 ANGELS NEPAL

Three years in: girls back in school, and communities investing in education.

Launched in early 2022, the Captivating Village Program (CVP) was created to bring measurable, lasting change for out-of-school girls in remote Nepal—girls who had missed most of their education and faced higher risk in communities where human trafficking is a serious threat. When a teenage girl has no schooling and no choices, she becomes especially vulnerable.

Three years later, our first three CVP sites in Manahari Rural Municipality concluded in June 2025, and the results were significant. 152 girls were supported to re-enter education and build consistent attendance—three years of schooling many would have otherwise missed. While some left due to early marriage or relocation, 87% (132 girls) completed the program and are now either still in school, in vocational training, or have graduated Grade 12 and moved forward.

One of the most important shifts came through government partnership. The municipality and education office decided to strengthen “education for all” by funding education-related expenses for children moving forward, reducing barriers for families long after the program’s initial cycle. Families were also supported economically: 14 parents joined the MBMF program to start small businesses, helping increase household income and support children’s continued education. Across the communities, CVP also contributed to mindset change through awareness efforts, youth-led advocacy, and tailoring centers that continue to provide practical, lifelong skills for women.

With the first three CVPs completed, the work is now expanding into three new remote villages, welcoming 162 new scholars. This brings our total active CVPs to nine, supporting a total of 455 girls.

CAPTIVATING VILLAGE PROGRAM
LOCATION: THORI AND JIRABHAWANI RURAL MUNICIPALITIES, AND BARAHATHAWA MUNICIPALITY
PARTNER: AASAMAN NEPAL

Alternative learning classes that helped girls return to school—and pushed local systems forward.

Over three years, our CVP partnership with Aasaman Nepal reached 33 remote locations through nine-month catch-up classes that helped out-of-school girls re-enter formal education at the highest grade possible.

In Thori and Jirabhawani Rural Municipalities, five village programs ran across 15 locations. 324 girls enrolled, and 85% (279 girls) completed the full course despite societal pressures. After graduating from the classes, girls took different next steps based on what was realistic for their situation: 98 returned to school, 139 moved into livelihood activities, and 42 balanced both school and income skills.

In Barahathawa Municipality, seven village programs concluded by December 2025 across 18 locations. 425 girls enrolled and 87% (371 girls) completed the program. From this group, 232 re-enrolled in school, while 54 chose vocational training. The team also completed the final ALP sessions with 85 girls in late 2025 and continues follow-up with local government and wards to support school enrollment in April 2026, aligned with the school calendar.

Beyond the girls, the program supported 3,000+ teachers, parents, and local leaders through training or livelihood support, and reached 22,000+ community members through awareness and back-to-school campaigns. Continuous advocacy is also influencing local decision-making, with local governments beginning to adopt the CVP model and invest in girls’ education and anti-trafficking initiatives.

CAPTIVATING VILLAGE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM
LOCATION: GAURISHANKAR, PANCHKHAL, GANESHMAN CHARNATH, AND PARSAGADHI MUNICIPALITIES
PARTNER: CAPTIVATING NEPAL

Two new municipalities: new learning centers, new pathways for girls.

In 2025, Captivating Nepal expanded into two new municipalities: Ganeshman Charnath and Parsagadhi. With four village programs now running, CVP is bringing education support, skills training, health care, and awareness activities to thousands of women and girls.

This year also marked a clearer, more practical approach to education barriers. 59 girls received scholarship support of up to NPR 8,000 (USD 56) each to help them return to class regularly. For girls who needed a different pathway, 26 began vocational training through partners including CTEVT, Zenith Academy, and UCEP Nepal. By year-end, 2 completed tailoring training and 9 completed a beautician course, while others continued training in fields such as mechanic, tailoring, barista, and beautician. Captivating Nepal covers training and hostel costs until completion, then supports girls toward internships and paid work.

In Ganeshman Charnath, the team established two community learning centers to provide foundation-level education for children from marginalized and economically disadvantaged families. With support from Street Child Nepal through Teaching at the Right Level (TaRL) training for educators and the Captivating Nepal team, 120 children were enrolled by December.

In Parsagadhi, 73 girls were enrolled in three new Alternative Learning Program (ALP) centers. This CVP adapts the approach we used with Aasaman Nepal, since Aasaman is working directly with Captivating Nepal in this village.

Health initiatives reached 1,548 people through free medical camps, including gynecological check-ups, VIA testing, mental health screenings, and medicine distribution. Following diagnoses, eight women received free uterine prolapse surgery. Women’s groups also strengthened livelihood skills in chicken, goat, and pig farming, while 1,248 people participated in anti-human trafficking awareness campaigns to help communities better protect women and girls.



YOUR IMPACT IN THE PHILIPPINES



MANILA SLUM PROGRAM
PARTNER: SANGHAYA FOUNDATION, INC.

A record year for education and stronger family stability.

In 2025, the Manila Slum Program reached a major milestone by launching Daan Tubo as our third MSP community—and our largest site in the Philippines to date. House-to-house interviews showed the level of need: 61% of families survive on less than PHP 100 (USD 1.73) a day. In response, the team helped 203 children return to the classroom, prioritizing those most at risk of exploitation. By year-end, MSP was supporting 566 children in school across our communities.

In our established MSP1 site, results also showed what consistency can do. During the 2024–2025 school year (ending in May), 76% of students maintained 80% or higher attendance—a major shift from before the program, when 55% of children were missing 80% or more of school days. This year also marked a milestone for older students: eight Grade 12 scholars across MSP1 and MSP2 graduated, with several already entering college through government scholarships.

Alongside education, MSP continued strengthening households. 233 mothers participated in employment opportunities and empowerment training—resulting in 115 securing jobs, 29 starting small businesses, and 76 actively pursuing employment. The program also reached 2,308 residents through OSAEC awareness, helping more families recognize risks and protect children.

STOP CYBERSEX CRIME: AWARENESS AND EDUCATION PROGRAM

PARTNER: SANGHAYA FOUNDATION, INC.

Prevention scaled through schools, barangays, and a national partner network.

Our prevention work expanded both wide and deep in the Philippines—prioritizing the adults and institutions best positioned to protect children every day. Awareness efforts extended to 16 schools and 43 barangays/local government units, mobilizing 695 community advocates—including barangay officials, school heads, and teaching and non-teaching staff. Compared to 2024, that’s a 647% increase in trained community advocates. We also saw a strong rise in the number of students reached throughout the year: 9,935 students in 2025, up from 6,050 in 2024. Beyond schools, community awareness sessions reached over 41,000 individuals, helping more families understand risks and take action early.

Another major milestone this year was scaling prevention through HOPE Worldwide Philippines, a partner operating 7 centers across Luzon and the Visayas. After Sanghaya trained their center heads and social workers, HOPE Worldwide reported readiness to run initiatives that will reach over 6,000 children, parents, and community leaders in high-risk areas.

To support sustained action beyond training sessions, Sanghaya also distributed 6,000 advocacy booklets across HOPE Worldwide’s locations nationwide—putting practical, easy-to-use tools into the hands of families and frontline workers where they’re needed most.

ONE HOPE MICROFINANCE PROGRAM

PARTNER: SANGHAYA FOUNDATION, INC.

Stability held—and growth resumed after a season of transition.

2025 was a year of rebuilding steady ground for One Hope Microfinance. The team worked through staffing changes and tighter budgets, while still showing up for women who rely on the program—not just for capital, but for structure, encouragement, and accountability through their groups.

Early in the year, the program made a practical decision to reduce costs as part of moving toward break-even sustainability. It was a behind-the-scenes shift, but an important one. As loan groups were transitioned and field support became steady again, growth followed. By year-end, One Hope welcomed 106 new clients, helping more mothers build stable household income. By December, the program had served 1,235 women in total.

Program performance also remained strong. Quarterly reporting shows a 0.00% current annual default rate (target: under 6% per year) and A\$0.00 defaulted amount, reflecting consistent monitoring and responsible repayment across the communities served.



BLESSED HOUSE PROJECT
PARTNER: SANGHAYA FOUNDATION, INC.

A milestone for credibility—and steady care for survivors.

Our partners at Sanghaya pursued accreditation from the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) for the Blessed Project and our wider community work. While our License to Operate remains valid for the next three years, accreditation is a higher level of recognition—one that reviews not only compliance, but the strength of our systems, standards of care, and program practices.

After a rigorous assessment process, we are grateful to share that Sanghaya successfully passed DSWD accreditation. This milestone affirms the quality of care we provide and reflects our commitment to best practices—both inside the Blessed House and across our community initiatives.

On the direct care side, the Blessed Project continued to provide safety and stability for survivors. By December, 18 survivors were being cared for in the Blessed House, while the team also supported the reintegration of 14 survivors as they moved toward safe, family-based care.

YOUR IMPACT IN CHINA



CHICKEN AND PIG FARMING PROGRAMS

180 households took first steps toward steadier income.

In 2025, our Chicken and Pig Farming Programs in Meigu County supported 180 households—90 in chicken farming and 90 in pig farming—helping families build practical, home-based sources of income.

Training officially began in May. With guidance from agricultural experts, participants learned core skills in breeding, feeding, and disease prevention, supported by continuous follow-up from our local team. Each woman received start-up livestock and supplies to begin right away: 2 piglets (for pig farmers) or 20 chicks (for chicken farmers), along with feed to help their farms get established.

Early results are already encouraging. In our most recent follow-up, many participants reported income growth. On average, pig farmers earned RMB 1,500 (USD 217) after selling one pig, while chicken farmers earned RMB 739 (USD 107) after selling a few chickens. For families who have long lived with limited options, these early earnings mean improved living conditions—and a pathway toward long-term stability.

What stood out most in follow-up conversations was the mindset shift: all families are eager to keep expanding their farms to reduce household expenses and better support their children's education.

HUSKY ENERGY TAILORING SKILLS PROGRAM FOR WOMEN

Twice the training—real income gains and practical independence.

The Husky Energy Tailoring Skills Program exists to give women aged 20–35, many of whom missed out on education, an opportunity to build skills, income, and independence. Women from remote, nomadic communities in Qinghai Province complete three months of intensive tailoring training, alongside life skills that support long-term progress, including basic reading and writing for sewing work and simple money management.

This year, two classes were held—twice as many as in previous years—opening the door for more women to join. Training began in April with 60 women enrolled, with four later withdrawing for personal reasons.

The results show why this program matters. Before training, participants earned an average of RMB 228 (USD 32) per month, and more than half had no income at all. After completing internship and beginning work, their average monthly income rose by 1,054%, reaching RMB 2,630 (USD 369).

By September, most graduates chose to work from home, either completing tailoring shop orders or taking personal orders—allowing them to earn while continuing to care for their families.

ONE MORE YEAR SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

A graduating class—and a new group stepping in.

133 One More Year (OMY) scholars graduated in 2025, completing a journey that began in 2022. Most are now moving forward into higher education, with 90% pursuing Bachelor's or Associate's degrees. Each graduate represents more than a milestone—they are proof of what can change when a student is given the support to stay in school and keep going.

As this group finished their studies, the program continued to make room for the next set of students. In September 2025, 150 new scholars joined the program, alongside 350 continuing students, replacing the graduates and 17 students who left during the year.

Field visits remain at the heart of this work, helping us identify children with the greatest need. Many come from ethnic minority families facing poverty, where parents are stretched thin—supporting multiple children while also caring for elderly relatives. Through the OMY Scholarship, students receive practical financial support, but just as importantly, the confidence to keep pursuing the future they hope for.



SEND A VOLUNTEER TEACHER PROGRAM

Consistent teachers in places that are often left behind.

30 volunteer teachers served 1,239 students across five schools in the remote mountains of Sichuan. They brought diverse skills and life experience into classrooms that often struggle to attract and retain qualified staff, while also helping strengthen connections between schools and the wider community.

These volunteers taught Mathematics, Chinese, and preschool classes, but their work didn't stop there. Many also carried additional responsibilities—serving as school principals or vice principals, supporting administration, and mentoring students through extracurricular activities and school programs.

Volunteer teachers in these areas face real hardship. The roads are rough, winters are harsh, and isolation is part of daily life. They also don't receive a salary. Instead, they rely on support through this program to cover basic needs so they can focus fully on teaching. For many of these schools, that support is the reason a classroom has a teacher at all—and why children can keep learning where opportunities are limited.

STOP TRAFFICKING 5K GLOBAL | AUGUST


A total of 231 participants ran, walked, and moved their way during the 2025 Stop Trafficking 5K. This global event raised USD 76,000 to help us continue our work in Nepal and the Philippines, protecting children from human trafficking and online sexual abuse.

17TH ANNUAL CAPTIVATING CHARITY AUCTION SHENZHEN | OCTOBER

On October 11, 2025, over 400 people gathered to support women and children in need. We are proud to share that this inspiring evening raised USD 144,000 (RMB 1 million), making a significant impact on the lives of girls, moms, and their families in China.

7TH HUSKY SANTA RUN SHENZHEN | DECEMBER

Shekou once again turned festive on December 6, 2025, as 425 registered Santas and volunteers from Husky and SCIE joined the annual Husky Santa Run. We raised enough to support another year of girls' education, volunteer teachers, and sustainable livelihoods for vulnerable families in China.





LOOKING AHEAD

As we look forward to 2026, we are fortunate to build upon a solid foundation of consistent support. With a 20-year history, Captivating International stands on the shoulders of dedicated funding partners and long-time supporters who make our work possible. Whether you represent a company or family funding entire programs, or you are an individual who has sponsored a child since our inception, we are deeply grateful for your commitment.

In 2026, our primary focus is to ensure full funding for our existing programs. We are currently 88% funded, with a remaining requirement of **USD 185k**. Once this goal is met, we aim to expand the following initiatives:

- **Manila Slum Program (MSP):** We plan to launch two new MSP communities. These will secure schooling for 400 girls, help mothers sustainably increase family incomes, and build resilient communities that prioritize education and child safety.
- **Captivating Village Development Programs:** In partnership with 3 Angels Nepal and Captivating Nepal, we intend to launch five new and expanded programs in remote, struggling communities across Nepal.

We are excited about the possibilities ahead and confident that your continued partnership will allow us to achieve even greater impact. Having financial partners—whether businesses, grant organizations, or community groups—willing to support programs through their typical three- to four-year timeframes is what makes this progress possible.
